Alumni from around Otago enjoyed a relaxed atmosphere at events before and after the NZSO Summer Pops with the Modern Māori Quartet concert at the Dunedin Town Hall on 2 March.

Host Professor Terence Dennis from Otago's Department of Music, Theatre and Performing Arts outlined highlights from his prolific career as a pianist, including accompanying worldrenowned soprano Dame Kiri Te Kanawa at more than 50 performances, before discussing the significant changes the Department had undergone since he joined its staff in 1981.

The Department often had cause to celebrate the successes of alumni such as Jonathan Lemalu, who will bring his Song in the Key of Life concert to Dunedin in April, and had worked to create a diverse educational setting which produced world-class research and graduates in a range of areas, from ethnomusicology to contemporary and classical performance.

Professor Dennis referred to alumni-funded scholarships for traditional Scottish bagpiping and drumming and Dr Jennifer Cattermole's work researching and recreating taonga pūoro (traditional Māori musical instruments) as examples of the breadth of work the Department did.
